

## BRIEF PRESENTATION OF THE AUTHORS

**Fátima Cecchetto**, Ph.D. in Collective Health (2002) and Master's Degree in Social Sciences (1997). Public Health Researcher at the Laboratory of Environmental and Health Education at Oswaldo Cruz Institute, Oswaldo Cruz Foundation. Professor at the Postgraduate Program in Public Health of the National School of Public Health - ENSP at Oswaldo Cruz Foundation, Brazil. Dr. Cecchetto's research emphasizes studies about violence and masculinity, race relations, gender and sexuality, based on the anthropological bias.

**Maj-Lis Follér** has a Ph.D. in human ecology, and is Associate Professor in Latin American Studies. She is at present researcher at School of Global Studies at the University of Gothenburg. She is currently working on AIDS-related research in Brazil and during the last year also in Mozambique. Follér has published several articles on this topic, latest Civil Society Organizations and Brazilian South-South AIDS Cooperation (*The Global South*, 4:1: 2010) and co-edited the anthology *The Politics of AIDS. Globalization, the State and Civil Society* (Palgrave 2008, with Håkan Thörn).

He conducts research on HIV prevention, sexual health, and program planning and evaluation in the United States and Brazil. He is a Senior Research Associate at Sociometrics, a company in San Francisco, California, USA that specializes in social science research.

His publications include the book *Travesti: sex, gender and culture among Brazilian transgendered prostitutes* (University of Chicago Press, 1998; translated as *Travesti: prostituição, sexo, gênero e cultura no Brasil*, Editora Fiocruz, 2008) and the articles 'Animais gordos e a dissolução da fronteiras entre as espécies', *Maná* 15(2): 481-50 (2009) and 'Lésbicas sem humor', *Dilemas: Revista de estudos de conflito e controle social* 1(1): 11-34 (2008).

**Esther Jean Langdon** is Professor and CNPq Researcher at the Federal University of Santa Catarina. She has resided in Brazil since 1983, where she studies Indian health policy, anthropology of health, narrative, shamanism, and indigenous anthropology. **Thaís Machado-Borges** is an anthropologist and research fellow at the Institute of Latin American Studies, Stockholm University, Sweden. She is the author of *Only for You! Brazilians and the Telenovela Flow* (Stockholm University, 2003), and has written articles in scholarly journals and popular magazines on topics such as women, bodies and visibility; body modification, class and modernity; media and transgression. She is currently researching on the theme of social inequality, women, garbage and consumption in Brazil.
