# Introduction

This plan of activities for Centre for Critical Heritage Studies (CCHS) summarizes activities, cost, collaborations, and value (academic, societal and global) preliminary outlined for 2021. The plan is divided in connection to the center-organization in research cluster, a research theme, the Heritage Academy and leadership common budget. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic it is complicated to plan for activities. The plan for this year is therefore expected to be changed in relation to altering restrictions and, as we all hope, gradually return to a more "normal" situation where we can arrange public activities, participate in live conferences, conduct fieldwork etc.

With this said, the largest part of CCHS total budget for 2021 will be used for salaries for cluster leaders at UGOT, administration and leadership. To the total amount for this year, ca 8.2 million SEK, we intend to add ca 1.4 million SEK from the surplus from 2016-2020. Of the total, ca 9.6 million SEK, ca 3.1 million SEK is set apart for personnel costs, 3.3 million SEK on operating costs and 3.2 SEK on indirect costs (OH). From the sum for operating costs 12% is set apart for CCHS UCL (657 200 SEK). The rest of the budget is split between the clusters/theme/Heritage Academy and CCHS "common" (see plans for activities below).

The initiatives Inside the Box and the Heritage Academy seed money will continue during 2021, as will the funding allocated to the CUP Elements series. Funding will also be allocated to cross-cutting activities in relation to the cross-cluster theme "waste/wasted heritage" and the work with a possible new master program in critical heritage studies at the University of Gothenburg (UGOT).



# Research Cluster 1: Making Global Heritage Futures (MGHF)

### Activities plan and budget

Making plans for the future is increasingly difficult to do with certainty. The Covid-19 pandemic has become a co-creator of global futures, abruptly and in unforeseeable ways reconfiguring the conditions for our activities and how we can operate. It has also affected us on a more personal level, in some cases the disease itself, but also through the government counter-measures, including remote work and homeschooling. Amidst these uncertainties we are approaching the final year of the 6 years of university funding for CCHS and need to establish the foundation of the post-UGOT Challenges existence of the Centre as well as develop critical heritage studies more broadly. Given the circumstances this will be a demanding task, but the challenge of the global pandemic in itself illustrates why this work is so

important. Interlaced with other pressing global concerns, such as climate change, threats to democracy, racism and the growing gap between rich and poor, the pandemic calls attention to the need to continue the work of critically and collaboratively engaging with how global heritage futures are being made and unmade.

#### Academic

2021 will be a year of consolidating the five years of cluster activities at the same time as we will initiate new exciting initiatives in order to contribute to the next step in the development of CCHS. The objective is to reinforce the position of CCHS as a vital global hub of critical heritage studies while developing the theoretical and conceptual framework of this academic field.

Starting with the new initiatives, the cluster plans to host an *online Pod Series* on the theme of heritage and waste, echoing the new conceptual framework of the Centre. Each installment of the pod series will centre around a newly published book in the intersection of heritage and waste and involve a conversation between the author and, for example, one of the cluster members. The conversation will be recorded and published online. The target audience for the pod series is both academic and non-academic actors with an interest in this field. We believe that the pod series will be a good way of providing a state-of-the-art debate about evolving new frontiers of critical heritage studies.

Second, and complementing the pod series, the cluster plans to host an *online "critical heritage key words" forum*, where we solicit brief input on key terms (similar to the Living lexicon or the Raymond Williams' Keywords Project). We envision this as a genealogical tracing of key concepts constituting the field of critical heritage studies, exploring their shifting semantics and analytical use over time. This conceptual mapping will be a major commitment that requires continuous collaborative work involving partners at UGOT, UCL and beyond, and has the potential of having a large impact on and consolidating Critical Heritage Studies as a field.

Third, reaching out to civil society actors and social movements, the cluster intends to launch an *intervention for co-producing knowledge* in the autumn. While still early in the planning, this could be an idea or concept competition similar to the Museums for Climate Action competition that Harrison recently co-arranged, or an experimental intervention such as the previous tagging project carried out by Bohlin and Appelgren where objects in second- hand shops were tagged. This could possibly take the form of some kind of online citizen science project focused on people's long-term relations to their belongings (the focus of one of our new research projects), resulting in an online exhibition.

While the three activities listed above are more uncertain and subject to Covid-19 adjustments, the cluster will also embark on a set of activities that are less likely to be affected by the pandemic, in particular, a number of research projects. The first is "Staying (with) Things," involving Appelgren and Bohlin, a continuation of their previous project Re:heritage. The aim of this project is to investigate possibilities for slower turnover of consumption of household objects, drawing on critical heritage studies and posthumanist perspectives. The second is Karlsson's Chile-project "Contemporary Archaeological Studies in the Atacama Desert (Chile)". The aim is to strengthen international collaboration between archaeologists in Chile and Sweden through approaching the material and reasonably recent remains of mining activities, military events and political dictatorship in the Atacama Desert. The project involves scholars from Gothenburg and Universidad Católica del Norte, Instituto de Investigaciones Arqueológicas y Museo R.P. Gustavo Le Paige (IIAM). Third, Carolina Valente Cardoso will start her three-year postdoc, growing out of a joined pilot study with Bohlin, which is based at Global Studies and Centre for Anthropological Research on Museums (CARMAH), Humboldt university, Berlin, 2022-2024. This will explore the role of unregistered objects in "parallel" or "handling" collections in ethnographic museums' attempts to deal with their colonial and racist pasts. As part of this research project Cardoso and Bohlin are also planning a joint workshop with the Centre for Environment, Heritage and Policy, University of Stirling, focusing on heritage objects and unruly collections.

Last, we will continue organizing a number of cluster activities that we have initiated over the years, including: the monthly Global Heritage Seminar, writing retreats, weekly writing sessions and conducting pilot studies.

#### Societal

The two major exhibitions in which our former research projects, Heritage Futures and Re:heritage, have showcased results, at the Ethnographic Museum in Stockholm and Manchester Museum respectively, will continue throughout the year. In addition, Appelgren is contributing to a new museum exhibition on Japanese Boro textiles at the Museum of Far Eastern Antiquities in Stockholm planned to open in January 2021, but currently postponed. Possible workshops in Cuba and Chile planned by Karlsson are also subject to the evolving pandemic situation. As in previous years, the cluster aims at having a strong presence in various forms of societal engagements, ranging from contributing to museum exhibitions to doing applied research with non-academic public and private actors, but currently specific plans are all pending awaiting the lifting of pandemic restrictions. In the meantime, we are moving most of our outreach activities online. The pod series already mentioned will be in the public domain, and also address audiences outside academia. Similarly, for the fall, a concept competition in the theme of heritage and waste will invite civil society actors to participate.

#### Global

The cluster explores pressing global challenges as they apply to processes across scales and in different settings, ranging from the minute and domestic to the large scale and public, and affecting human as well as non-human worlds. To this effect the cluster continues to develop close collaborations in various parts of the world including Japan, China, Sri Lanka, Ukraine, Rwanda, South Africa, Angola, Mozambique, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Syria, Cuba, Chile, Colombia, Argentina, USA as well as various countries in the EU. The most recent example of the geographically expanding network of the cluster is the two applications to the EUTOPIA postdoc research fellowships submitted by candidates from France and Spain in early 2021. We thus continue to work collaboratively with academic partners, but also with actors and stakeholders in the wider society on how perspectives of critical heritage can enable new approaches to sustainable and democratic global flows of ideas, materials, commodities and waste.

# Research Cluster 2: Curating the City (CC)

### Activities plan and budget

Academic, societal and global value

The work will continue to be organized around the interdisciplinary synergies between UCL and UGOT, external engagements as well as local and international networks. The plan also includes cross-cluster collaborations with the Heritage and Wellbeing cluster (on psychological aspects of places), and the Embracing the Archives cluster (on urban place practices). The policy area Gestaltad Livsmiljö also provides a common ground for new initiatives in between Dept of Conservation, HDK-Valand and HSM.

Our themes have academic, societal and global value, in short: the theme *Universities & urban heritage* through its focus on the exchange between the university and society in terms of physical intervention, knowledge production on the city itself, as well as agendas and ambitions; the theme *Mending, repairing, caring*, through a focus upon the urgent anthropocenic need for the development of knowledge that departs from 'broken world thinking'; the theme *Hidden Sites* through the practical formatting of local place-based platforms for exchange of knowledge and ideas between creative practitioners and heritage practitioners; the theme *Toxic Heritage* through a serious cross-disciplinary and cross-faculty engagement with the temporalitity of toxins in historic buildings.

The local presence of the cluster increases through Hidden sites events, involving a series of external public actors and including public outreach. The basis is the collaboration established with the city Museum of Gothenburg, Lilla Änggården. The 2021 activities of the cluster comprise events that have been postponed because of Covid-19. Research-wise, the focus will be summoning up the themes, along with publishing and applying for funding (cf below).

# **Research Cluster 3: Embracing the Archive (EA)**

### Activities plan and budget

Academic, societal and global value

The work within the cluster within 2021 will continue to be organized around the archival and digital humanities platforms drawing on interdisciplinary synergies between UCL and UGOT, recent theoretical developments in particular within archival science, critical historiography and critical digital humanities, external engagements, as well as local and international networks. This year we will prioritize honing and finalizing longstanding and joint UCL and UGOT projects and activities to enhance synergies and intensify critical and innovative cross border collaboration.

In several of the projects and networks, outreach to the public in combination with close collaboration with museums and external archival institutions are at the core. Co-creative engagement will continue to be a guiding principle, emphasized through community engagement, and collaboration with archival institutions as well as independent archives. Further, all cluster initiatives and projects draw on innovative, open and inclusive understandings of archives and the digital as potentially powerful actors able to affect societal change in local/global and global/local arenas. They incorporate and depart from conventional understandings of archives and digital cultural heritage to contribute engaging methodologies for just, inclusive and conscious futures.

Groundbreaking development work with an Infrastructure for research based digital cultural heritage implementations will continue during 2021. Currently, the platform is made up of functional modules as to make it generic, scalable and flexible depending on the research project, facilitating both close readings and quantitative analysis, and further to maximize reuse of applications, materials and modules in past and future projects. The platform functionality is currently geared towards time-space related data visualizations, network analyses/visualizations and 3D assets positioned in spatial contexts (more about the specific projects below).

Our main focus areas during 2021 are:

### Focus area 1: Participatory archival and history-making practices in a digital age.

The strand *Dig where you stand* (DWYS) will during 2021 hone its work on developing models for better representing marginalised / under-voiced communities in close relation to critical digital humanities. In particular the strand will continue taking on the global issue of representing diversities within performing arts, heritage, and migration.

During 2021 the strand will finalize the work with Astrid von Rosen's digital-historiographical project *Expansion and Diversity: Digitally mapping and exploring independent performance in Gothenburg* 

1965–2000. Andrew Flinn and Julianne Nyhann will work on two areas and organise two international conversations and engage in international research networks:

- 1. *digital oral history*. How might digitisation and digital humanities approaches might recover hidden voices and undervalued stories from the many legacy oral histories recordings lost in the archives.
- 2. Archives of conflict & social justice Looking at the work of activists, archivists, lawyers, etc to establish, preserve and use archive and documentation techniques to record acts of violence by state actors against citizens (including but not exclusively in times of war) and marginalised/underpowered individuals and communities

In tandem with the CCHS waste theme, Alda Terracciano and Jonathan Westin will continue their work to expand the *SHIMON (Syrian Heritage in Motion Network)* international network of academics, activists, and heritage specialists established in the previous year. Alda Terracciano will continue to develop publication and dissemination activities related to archiving and preservation of black British (with global materials) theatre archives, as well as public engagement activities with BAME communities in London. The *Future Histories Archive*, will be employed as a critical tool to explore issues related to archiving performing arts, and to creative protest cultures within the black diaspora. Another project is finding ways of publishing the English translation of *Dig Where You Stand*. This text is as a concrete legacy for the cluster and should be an open access resource to scholars and activists in the English-speaking world.

#### Focus area 2: Visualizations and geospatial and critical discursive mapping technologies

The projects within this strand all focus on developing critical interfaces and cross-connected platforms that are designed to move beyond access and dissemination to actively include exploration, co-curating and co-creation as a model for digital cultural heritage. We will particularly focus on spatiotemporal data visualizations and augmented, mixed, and virtual reality vizualisations. The cluster will continue the development of a scalable visualization platform for digitized archival material. All the projects engage researchers as well as museums and cultural institutions through workshops and seminars.

The projects are

- \* Expansion and Diversity
- \* Narratives of the Sea from Gothenburg to Valletta 1750–1950
- \* Machine Learning and Rock Art
- \* On constructing cultural heritage in Antarctica

#### Other activities are:

- \* The conference *Beyond humanistic models and fabrications* will take place in the fall (collaboration with with the Arosenius project/CDH and funded by Vitterhetsakademien).
- \*EA will co-organise an event open for the public at Humanisten on *Cultural Heritage, digitization and AI* (with CDH and the Faculty of Humanities)

Further, the focus will also be on continued collaborations

- \* the use of digitized cultural heritage in research and publication of research results on cultural heritage objects in *K-samsök* (with the Swedish National Heritage Boar).
- \* a joint application for the development of an interactive story and the reconstruction of Ivar Arosenius home (with Sussex Humanities Lab on Immersive Storytelling)

#### Focus area 3: Textual Heritage

Through collaborations between CDH and the Swedish Literature Bank, we will continue to develop a digital environment, a literary lab, with tools for critical textual analysis as well as mappings and

visualizations of humanities data (several overlaps with focus area 1 and 2). The recently funded project, *Literary Cultural Heritage as Source Material for the Humanities and Social Sciences (Malm*, RJ), will start during 2020 and this area will be furthered through grant applications and a close collaboration with Språkbanken during 2021.

### Focus area 4: Archival Historiography

Maria Cavallin-Aijmer will work in the recently funded project *Historians and Archives: The history discipline and archival theory in Sweden, 1880–2020.* The project is a collaboration between EA, Department of history GU, Archival Science Södertörn university and Department of History, Mid Sweden University. It attempts to combine perspectives from history and archival science in a new way, which both creates new empirical knowledge and understanding on the historical relations between two fields of knowledge production, as well as inspires the development of theoretical discussions and perspectives within both fields.

# Research Cluster 4: Heritage and Wellbeing (HW)

# Activities plan and budget

In 2021 two major themes of the cluster; *The heritage of psychiatry and madness* and *Minority heritage* will be further developed. Activities concerning Sites of conscience, involving these two themes but also including others, will also be in focus.

# I Heritage of psychiatry and madness

The edited peer-reviewed book "Narrating the heritage of psychiatry" is to be published at Brill: the publication is a result of the international, interdisciplinary conference "The material and immaterial heritage of psychiatry", hosted by the cluster in Gothenburg, June 2019.

The work with establishing the heritage of psychiatry and madness as important research fields that involve users of psychiatry and participatory research will continue, for example through collaboration with the association Mad heritage and contemporary arts and through a forthcoming publication named 'Sites of Conscience and the Unfinished Project of Deinstitutionalization: Place, Memory and Social Justice', co-edited with Dr Linda Steele, University of technology, Sydney. Dr Steele will also visit CCHS toward the end of the year, if possible.

Several books will be launched during 2021 and the cluster will make relevant events connected to them. These will be adapted to the current pandemic situation. There will also be a focus on the heritage of poetry and literature and their connection to mental health and de-stigmatization.

#### II Minority heritage

This theme will continue with respect to Jewish heritage, psychoanalysis and Jiddisch and unaccompanied refugee minors. During 2021 it will be expanded to include the heritage of the Sami.

Activities involve conference presentations, artistic representations, and collaborations with heritage institutions and Linda Steele, University of technology, Sydney. Studies concerning unaccompanied minors from Afghanistan, with a focus on integration, on the parts of the Afghan heritage they miss and the parts they strive to maintain, and the parts of the Swedish heritage they appreciate and strive to embrace will be finalized and published in 2021. There will also be an exhibition connected to this research theme, with talks by researchers and a vernissage with photos from Afghanistan by world-renowned photographer and winner of "World press photo of the year", 2013, Paul Hansen.

Academic

Book launches for "Spaces heritage and wellbeing", "Narrating the heritage of psychiatry". Workshop, "Sites of conscience", Book production "Mad heritage" and "Sites of conscience". Heritage of poetry and mental health.

### Societal

# Activities plan and budget

Academic

The cluster for 2021 will build on work started during 2020 and focus on two main themes. The first is related to how science can be used to improve the understanding and preservation of cultural heritage with specific focus on conservation science while the second will be the common theme "Waste".

#### Science and conservation

It will continue to be a platform to discuss issues pertaining to the role of science in conservation and how deterioration, life events and conservation affects the way objects are viewed and used in museums. Following discussions as to how conservation is used to delay or block decolonising museums, we aim to create a dialogue on the role of conservation and how science can be used to facilitated access and use of objects and sites.

One important issue to focus, especially after September, will be modern materials with a panel on analytical methods used to survey museum collections such as those used for surveying the plastic collection of the National Archives in Stockholm.

Advances in scientific fields such as analytical chemistry and applied physics and the application of novel methods and tools in conservation, archaeology and technical art history offer new ways to assess past and current practices.

These activities will aim to: 1. examine how common conservation actions such as cleaning affect perception of objects and 2. assess how treatments can erase evidence of the past, such as DNA or residues that could shed light to the past.

As part of both focus areas (Conservation and Science and Waste) there will be an international meeting to discuss cleaning will be planned for June which will coincide with the first draft of the book on cleaning by the Getty. The meeting will include heritage professionals, scientists, conservators, archaeologists, anthropologists, art historians and artists to explore whether professional decision-making in museums is affected by the connotations and social norms associated with cleaning as a household chore. Colleagues from Sweden, the U.K., Germany, Greece, Spain and the U.S will be invited. The two-day meeting will also lead to future projects and collaborations.

A follow up meeting to that organised in November on Critical Assessment of the Conservation of Wall Paintings in Sweden will be planned as part of the RAA-funded project. The next meeting will dive

Other activities will be planned in collaboration with Theano Moussouri as part of the Waste theme.

deeper into attitudes and training as well as use or lack thereof scientific methods in everyday practice.

The impact of conservation on DNA will be examined during the autumn with members of other clusters invited to discuss the life of an object after excavation entitled "Rebirth and life of objects after excavation". The event will be open to the public and a panel will debate whether all actions are

necessary, where in the process data is lost and who contributes to that. This event might be either in Gothenburg or in London.

The cluster will host a number of speakers, including Tom Lerner, Rachel Rivenc, Anna Lagana and others starting in the late spring and continuing until the end of the year. At least 4 public lectures will be planned, most probably online.

As part of the cluster Golfomitsou will have a presentation at the ICOM-CC Beijing Congress on Conservation and Cleaning which will be virtual in May.

#### Societal

The cluster will work towards connecting with scientists, conservators and the public and explore ways that conservation of museum objects as well immovable heritage can bring people from local communities together and bridge gaps in society. Conservation continues to spark interest in world press, but there is often little understanding of the impact of treatment on perception, or the reason that preserving ancient DNA is critical. All hosted lectures will be open to the public and widely advertised on social media. The Inside the Box event if we could do it will be in English hoping to engage with people from Gothenburg who do not necessarily speak Swedish. It is expected that events will raise issues related to wider societal issues, such as climate change and the appropriation of heritage, repatriation and migration, and will use objects to explore different cultures.

# Global

The international relevance of the cluster is immense given efforts to consolidate the strong relationship between everyday practice in heritage conservation and scientific inquiry. Climate change leads to accelerated deterioration of artefacts, changing degradation patterns and posing new risks to collections and heritage worldwide. Chemical and physical changes of materials affect the way heritage is understood, interpreted and enjoyed by the public. Conservation treatments need to be examined under the new framework and updated following 21<sup>st</sup> century green and sustainable goals. GU and UCL (Institute of Archaeology, Chemistry department, Sustainable Heritage and History of Art) are best placed to lead this theme, given our complimentary expertise in research, art conservation training, heritage science and public engagement.

The cluster also aims to be a link between the European efforts to establish Heritage Science as an interdisciplinary umbrella uniting heritage, practical conservation, natural sciences and information sciences and the Swedish and British efforts to develop heritage science.

# The Heritage Academy/Kulturarvsakademin (HA/KAA)

#### Activities plan and budget

The aim of the Heritage Academy is to function as a bridge between the surrounding society, heritage practitioners and the university. The activities within the Heritage Academy therefore are somewhat different from the others and it is more difficult to plan and foresee what to do in the next years. The Heritage Academy has to be in line with what is happing in the surrounding society in order to make activities of interest.

The Heritage Academy coordinators are working closely with, and are planning for activities and programs in dialogue with the steering committee. 11

One aim of the organization is to build a network of working groups that will make joint projects and activities.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic situation several planned activities was cancelled for 2020. Planned activities for 2021 has therefore been changed too and there is still uncertainties due to the situation how it will be possible to conduct planned activities for 2021. But, we try to be flexible and to look forward. If the pandemic situation should be better during spring we consider different other activities to take

place (not described here), as for example Interpretation workshops and activities for the Heritage and Food network.

#### Academic

The ISN (Interpret Sweden Netwok) is planning for a series of webinars during spring 2021 with the aim of strengthening and building the network. Contact has been taken with the Norwegian Interpretation Network that will participate in the webinars 22 February, 22 March and 22 April. Hopefully we will develop ISN during spring and further on connect to the Interpret Europe Network. The aim is also to make a strong northern network about interpretation together with the Norwegian and Danish networks of interpretation. This work is also done in cooperation with SLU (Statens lantbruksuniversitet) and RAÄ (Riksantikvarieämbetet, National Heritage Board).

The network Heritage and food (#matarv) is planning for a joint publication to be released in November 2021. The publication is research based but aimed at an interested public. The book consists of about 18 different articles written by researchers at the University of Gothenburg representing different faculties and institutions and heritage workers from archives and museums in the region of West Sweden.

The Heritage Academy will take part in the Swedish meeting for Museums 27-29/4 at Gotland. The HA will make a presentation of its organization and activities at the conference. It is still uncertain whether the conference will be online or in place at Gotland. The conference has been postponed two times already.

In late May (27) we will hopefully be able to arrange the earlier planned day about Heritage and Creativity at the culture house Kåken in Gothenburg. The evening is planned in cooperation with the Heritage and Wellbeing cluster and is connected to the former exhibition "The women from Ravensbrück" (2020).

The Heritage Academy is involved in the research project *Knowledge tourism as attraction and resource. Theme 3: Knowledge tourism mediation and consumption* writing an article. The owner of the project is the center for tourism at the School of Business, Economics and Law at UGOT. The Visiting Industry Research and Development Fund (BFUF) granted the project for the period 2020-2022.

The main event for 2021 will be the Heritage Fair 8-10 November. Since we had to cancel the planned Heritage fair for 2020 and the spring conference 2021 we will instead have a two day Heritage Fair and a post conference day for the Interpret Sweden Network. Hopefully the pandemic situation will be better at that time of the year since we are planning for international and national speaker and attendances (in total about 200 participants). The University main building in Vasaparken has been reserved for the conference.

#### Societal

The work with the ISN network can also be considered societal as it aims to reach out to people in a wide area (heritage workers, artists, local communities and others interested in the field of interpretation).

The forthcoming publication Heritage and food will be available for a broader audience, not only academic and will be published by Carlssons bokförlag.

The presentation at the museum conference at Gotland can also be considered being societal since there will be an audience at the conference consisting of people from different areas of the heritage sector and not only academics.

In late May (27) we will hopefully be able to arrange the earlier planned day about Heritage and Creativity at the culture house Kåken in Gothenburg and open to a common public.

#### Global

The work with the ISN network has to be considered global as our aim is to connect to Interpret Europe Network which also work in a global context.

The article to be written within the research project *Knowledge tourism as attraction and resource*. *Theme 3: Knowledge tourism mediation and consumption* will be published in an international journal for tourism.

The Heritage Fair in November 2021 will have global themes and international speakers.

# Postponed activities and funding from 2020

Since there were several activities cancelled 2020 the HA has unused funds (approximately 200 000 SEK) that we will used for activities during 2021. The publication of the heritage and food publication will demand some extra funding from this budget post. Also the Heritage Fair will demand extra funding since this conference will be the size of about three smaller conferences. The UGOT Challenge funding for 2020 is 8 215 000 SEK. To this we will add close to 1.4 million SEK from the surplus from 2016-2020. The leadership/common part of the budget includes basic costs for meetings, travels, UCL 12 % and common strategic investments as listed below.

In accordance with strategies for the future we will proceed with work concerning a cross faculty master in critical heritage studies at UGOT. To coordinate these plans and form a syllabus based on cross-disciplinary courses the intention is to allocate funds for a coordinator (ca 30%, 6 months) to be in charge of this work.
